Following a busy start to 2019, with the launch of two new co-commissions (Miao Ying and Craig Easton), plus the tour of Ruth Barker and Hannah Leighton-Boyce's exhibition to Glasgow Women's Library, March allows us a little time to pause and reflect, to research and plan ahead.

This issue of our newsletter highlights how our work can impact on people in different ways: Fine Art student Richard Benbow comments on the valuable opportunity to make <u>new artwork to be shown at Salford Museum and Art Gallery</u>, a place that has a special meaning for him; and Creative Writing student <u>Jazmine Linklater continues to be inspired</u> by our Ruth Barker & Hannah Leighton-Boyce exhibition at <u>Castlefield Gallery</u> last year.

I recently presented our work at <u>Strategies of Digital Curating</u>, a workshop run by the <u>Contemporary Art Society</u> and <u>Serpentine Gallery</u>. I talked about our approach to cocommissioning artists to make new work for the collection, and the importance of working with artists to overcome some of the perceived technical issues with developing a museum collection of 'born digital' artworks. What struck me about the workshop was how all the presenters talked about the need for collaboration, and a sense of community, between artists, curators, producers, technicians and conservators. Meanwhile, in this newsletter, Assistant Curator Stephanie Fletcher reflects on her participation in Prof Beryl Graham's one-week intensive course <u>Curating Art after New Media</u>.

Collaboration and building networks are at the heart of the work of the Art Collection team. As such we are working in partnership with <u>Open Eye Gallery</u> and <u>Centre for Chinese</u> <u>Contemporary Art</u> (CFCCA) and on behalf of Arts Council England and the <u>GREAT</u> <u>campaign</u>, to lead a delegation of curators and arts professionals on a research trip to Hong Kong, specifically the largest art fair in Asia <u>Art Basel Hong Kong</u>. Acquired: a century of collecting

On Wednesday 6 March Salford Museum and Art Gallery and the University of Salford hosted a celebratory event of 100 years of collecting and exhibiting contemporary art in Salford. The event also launched a new exhibition of work by <u>BA Fine Art</u> staff and students, made in response to work in <u>Acquired: a century of collecting</u>.

BA Fine Art student Richard Benbow, who produced a print in response to Chris Paul Daniels and Sam Meech's video piece <u>One Square Mile</u> reflected on the evening saying:

'I feel I learned a lot from this opportunity and it was fantastic to meet the Mayor (City Mayor of Salford Paul Dennett) and tell him a bit about myself and my work and to Meet Chris Paul Daniels on the night too and then see how enthusiastic he was about my response.'

He also reflects on the role Salford Museum and Art Gallery has had on his life.

Artist Chris Paul Daniels said: 'It was a real surprise to attend the exhibition and see Richard's thoughtful response to our film amongst the other great responses to the collection. It was a pleasure to meet and hear him speak about how he took the film as a springboard for his own work that concisely communicates his own layered perspectives, ideas and politics. Part of the pleasure in having 'One Square Mile' be part of the University of Salford Art Collection is the work having a legacy audience and it was so humbling to see Richard's work made in dialogue to mine and Sam's (Meech) film.'

<u>Acquired: a century of collecting</u>, an exhibition exploring the art collections of Salford Museum and Art Gallery and University of Salford, continues until Sunday 9 June.

University of Salford Creative Writing student <u>Jazmine Linklater's poem *Installation*</u> was published in the current issue of <u>Poetry Wales</u> (Winter 2018 Edition). The poem was inspired by Ruth Barker's work, which Jazmine originally saw at <u>Castlefield Gallery</u>.

Barker (Glasgow) and Leighton-Boyce's (Manchester) works were developed as a result of research residencies undertaken by the artists in 2017/18, and premiered at Castlefield Gallery in March 2018. Leighton-Boyce was in residence at <u>Glasgow Women's Library</u>, and Barker with the University of Salford.

A selection of the commissioned artworks by Ruth Barker and Hannah Leighton-Boyce have been acquired into the University Art Collection.

Curating Art after New Media



Exploring digital prints, born-digital, video games and design-based acquisitions at the V&A.

In February 2019 I spent a brilliant and thought-provoking week with artists, curators, and creative producers for the <u>Curating Art after New Media professional development course</u>, organised by Professor Beryl Graham of <u>CRUMB</u>.

Together we asked about the possibilities and challenges of new media in galleries, museums and other art (and non-art) spaces; as well as more broadly addressing the shifting roles of the curator, the institution, the maker, and the audience today; through visits to a broad host of central London venues - including the <u>Science Gallery</u>, <u>Furtherfield</u>, <u>Tate</u> and <u>the V&A</u>.

It's impossible to summarise the breadth and depth of conversation and learning, but I have no doubt about the short and long term positive impacts to the way we develop and articulate the art collection at the University of Salford – in particular, our <u>About the Digital</u> strand.
