Japanese Research Trip



Reincarnation of Media Art, Yamaguchi Center for Arts and Media, Japan

On Monday, Curator Lindsay Taylor returned from a 10-day research trip to Japan, generously funded by the Japan Foundation and the Ishibashi Foundation. Six professionals from the UK, Germany and Poland were invited to participate in the Exchange Programme for Specialists in Contemporary Art. The intensive programme included visits to museums and galleries in Tokyo, Yamaguchi, Chiba and Towada and introductions to artists and curators from across Japan. It culminated in an international symposium in Mito: $Play \Leftrightarrow Replay: staging \& re-staging time-based media$ art, which brought together experts from Europe and Japan, to exchange views and ideas on the production and exhibition of time-based media art and present specific examples from their own perspectives.

"The entire trip was exceptionally well planned and considered. In addition to increasing my knowledge of Japanese contemporary culture, I also return to the UK with a strong network of peers from Germany and Poland. In particular the research visit to <u>Yamaguchi</u> <u>Center for Arts and Media</u> was mind blowing. It demonstrated how art and technology can thrive together and offer new and exciting opportunities for communities to engage with both. On our visit we encountered a great exhibition (*Reincarnation of Media Art*) in a specially constructed 'mausoleum', as well as an amazing and packed interactive indoor playground, designed in part by local children. We also visited the workshops and research labs, the theatre and cinema and learnt about their progressive approach to artist led research and development." Lindsay Taylor.

Curator Amy Stevenson selected work from submissions by artists from the <u>University of</u> <u>Salford Art Collection and School of Arts & Media Graduate Scholarship Scheme</u>. Amy, an alumna of the Graduate Scholars Scheme, managed the booth with fellow alumnus Elliott Flanagan. The fair proved a valuable professional development experience for all the artists, and provided numerous opportunities to network and profile the wider work of the Art Collection Team and the <u>School of Arts and Media</u>.

The Scholarship Scheme, running since 2014, provides support, mentoring and cash bursaries in the first year after graduation and is developed with Castlefield Gallery and our partners at Hot Bed Press, Islington Mill, Mirabel Studios, Paradise Works and Redeye: The Photography Network.

Exhibitions

Acquired: a century of collecting

Charting a 100-year history of collecting this exhibition explores artworks from Salford Museum and Art Gallery and the University of Salford collections.

Paintings, ceramics, sculpture, print and digital works from the two collections are displayed together, some for the first time in public. The exhibition aims to tell the story of how the collections in Salford have been developed over the last century and in turn considers how public collections can, and do, support artists.

The exhibition includes recent additions to the University of Salford Art Collection; <u>Mountain of Crowds</u> by Yang Yongliang, purchased with support from Art Fund, and in association with Centre for Chinese Contemporary Art (CFCCA), and *Bhangra Muffins* by Shezad Dawood, donated from the Thomas Frangenberg Estate (London) through the Contemporary Art Society.

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In focus: Chinese Contemporary Art

In the first of our In Focus series we explore elements of our Chinese Contemporary Art Collection - including a triptych by artist Liang Yue, a recent co-commission by Liverpool City Council in partnership with University of Salford Art Collection and Open Eye Gallery.

The Chinese Contemporary Art collection has been developed since 2013, mainly in partnership with the Centre for Chinese Contemporary Art (CFCCA). The artists range from emerging through to established, and come from mainland China, Taiwan, Hong Kong and the diaspora.

Selected works from the *Push and Pull* exhibition, previously shown in the New Adelphi Exhibition Gallery, will be on display in the Council Chamber of the Old Fire Station, University of Salford.

The exhibition draws together prints made in and around Salford and Manchester from the late 1970s to the present day, including works made at the Manchester Print Workshop, Hot Bed Press and Islington Mill alongside new work by University of Salford graduates.
