Peer to Peer

Peer to Peer opened to great acclaim last month – read a <u>review in the Fourdrinier here</u>. The exhibition at <u>St George's Hall</u> and <u>Open Eye Gallery</u> Liverpool showcases work by 14 photographers from the UK and China, nominated by experts in the field. Curated by Lindsay Taylor, with Thomas Dukes and Serein Lui, the exhibition tours to <u>Shanghai Centre</u> <u>of Photography</u>, opening on 8 December.

An integral part of the project is new commissions offered to two of the artists by the University of Salford Art Collection. The selected artists are Anna Ridler and Wu Yue.

University of Salford Curator Lindsay explains –'both artists were selected as their work tackles global issues in subtle and innovative ways. Anna Ridler's beautiful installation (nominated by John O'Shea, Head of Programming, Science Gallery London) uses historic references to question financial values and systems. I particularly liked her use of technology including AI. Wu Yue (nominated by Liu Heung Shing, Founder, Shanghai Center of Photography) looks at the growing 'problem' of aging populations. Her images are full of sensitivity, humour and humanity'. Both artists receive £5000 to make new work for the University Art Collection.

Photographer Craig Easton to receive Alumni Achievement Award

We are pleased to announce that Salford alumnus and Art Collection photographer Craig Easton will receive a <u>University of Salford Alumni Achievement Award</u> next month.

Craig was nominated for his work as an internationally renowned and award-winning photographer – and specifically for his work on the *SIXTEEN* project (exhibited in the New Adelphi Exhibition Gallery, University of Salford in February - May 2019), giving a voice to a group of sixteen-year-old participants through exploring their dreams, ambitions, hopes and fears for their future.

Although Craig studied Physics at the University of Salford, he says he spent much of his time in the university's photographic darkrooms. Best known for his dramatic landscape work and his intimate portraits of real lives, Craig's early career was defined by his work as a photographer for The Independent newspaper in London and he has since gone on to win numerous awards for both his commissioned work and personal projects.

Craig will receive his award at the Salford Alumni Celebration event on Thursday 12 December at MediaCityUK.

He was a wild one

He was a wild one draws together British music photography from the 1950s and 1960s, from the <u>Open Eye Gallery</u> archive in Liverpool and the University of Salford Art Collection.

Photographs from Open Eye Gallery include works by Harry Hammond and the F Beat Archive. London-born Hammond (1920 – 2009) was the primary photographer for the New Musical Express (NME) magazine from the early 1950s.

From the University of Salford Art Collection, photographer Harry Goodwin (1924 - 2013) followed a similar trajectory. Born in Fallowfield, Manchester, Goodwin worked as a scene-shifter at the BBC Manchester Studios, alongside photographing beauty pageants and boxing matches. This led to an opportunity in 1964 to join BBC's Top of the Pops as a photographer, where he captured almost every single Top 30 Act until 1973.

The project is part of *Together We Move*.

Our latest co-commission with CFCCA and <u>Videoclub</u>, the work serves as a new chapter in Cheng's *Diary of a Madman* series; an ongoing growing project filmed in different cities. Previous works were completed during short residencies in New York, Jerusalem and Hong Kong between 2016 – 2017.
